

Dewey Education Philosophy



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American, Philosophers. Democracy and education by John Dewey is the greatest work of the Philosophy of Education. Indeed, Dewey is the initiator of the "hands-on learning", opposed to a "lecturing" approach. Dewey created a laboratory school away from the usual authority where the teacher is a guide, and where the student learns by doing.

Dewey and Education - Philosophy & Philosophers

Dewey came to the University of Chicago at the urging of James Hayden Tufts, a colleague at the University of Michigan who joined the Chicago faculty in 1892. Appointed to head the Department of Philosophy, Dewey's experimentalism blended well with the views of George Herbert Mead and Tufts.

His idea was that children came to school to do things and live in a community which gave them real, guided experiences which fostered their capacity to contribute to society.

Dewey's educational philosophy emerged amidst a fierce 1890's debate between educational

“romantics” and “traditionalists”. Romantics (also called “New” or “Progressive” education by Dewey), urged a “child-centered” approach; they claimed that the child’s natural impulses provided education’s proper starting point.
